HIKING ON APALACHIAN TRAIL Saturday April 27, 2013

We arrived to Gathand State Park around 9:00 AM by 2 cars. One drove from Silver Spring by Tr. Hieu, and the other from Germantown area by Tr. Hung. After dropping off the scouts at Gathand, we have to drive both cars to Weverton and leave one car there. We started hiking around 10 AM. The down trailing was stiff and rocky. It took about 45 minutes to get to the parking lot. They boys rested and sun bathed while waiting for the ride. Overall, it was a good hike. The boys did a great job and we can proudly said we had hike the famous Appalachian Trail.

The precise length of the trail changes over time as trails are modified or added. The total length is approximately 2,200 miles (3,500 km)^[a]. The trail passes through the states of Georgia, North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine

TROOP 1794 SUMMER CAMP 2013 CAMP OLMSTED GOSHEN SCOUT RESERVATION

Troop 1794 has reservations for Camp Olmsted at the Goshen Scout Reservation for the week of 29 June – 6 July 2013. Camp Olmsted is a Boy Scout resident camp located around 450-acre Lake Merriweather. Thomas Jefferson once called this area the "Garden of Eden of the United States." Food is served at Olmsted's dining hall. Youth sleep in two-man tents with cots. Camp is accredited annually by the BSA and must meet the State of Virginia standards. Scouts attend with their unit or may attend our provisional camp during the first four weeks. Camp Olmsted offers a wide variety of merit badge programs. The Technology Center has up-to-date equipment in a climate controlled environment! More info can be found at: http://www.boyscouts-ncac.org/goshen-scout-reservation/camps/camp-olmsted/15977

You can earn 6 or 7 merit badges in a week, or you can attempt to break the Troop record of 11 merit badges earned by 9 scouts in Summer 2007.

Merit Badges Offered:

- Aquatics: Kayaking, Canoeing, Lifesaving, Rowing, Swimming, and Small Boat Sailing.
- **Scoutcraft**: Orienteering, Wilderness Survival, Camping, Fishing, Pioneering, Emergency Preparation, Orienteering, Backpacking, and Hiking.
- **Technology Center**: Electronics, Electricity, Computers, Scholarship, Energy, Aviations, Space Exploration, Journalism, and Astronomy.
- **Shooting Sports:** Rifle, Shotgun, and Archery.
- Handicraft: Leatherwork, Basketry, Textile and Woodcarving.

• Ecology: Bird Study, Mammals, Nature, Oceanography, Soil & Water, Geology, Weather, Environmental Science, Forestry, Insect Study, Fish and Wildlife Management, and Reptiles & Amphibians.

- CultureCraft: Art, Sculpture, Pulp & Paper, Music, Photography, Cinematography, Theater, Architecture, Archeology, Indian Lore, and American Heritage.
- Admin Area: First Aid and Communications
